Overview

This Module introduces students to the law pertaining to real estate development and investment in Singapore. Students will acquire an understanding and appreciation of the policies, circumstances and legal principles which underpin and shape the law on the availability, ownership, development and usage of real estate in Singapore. Students will also gain insight into legal analysis and modes of legal reasoning. This module is targeted at all students across Faculties who have had no exposure to Real Estate Law and wish to acquire a broad understanding of the multiple legal issues that pertain to the built environment.

Intended Learning Outcomes

Students will learn to:

- Describe the key legislative constructs and mechanisms to achieve policy outcomes
- Explain the rationale for the various legislative controls in real estate development
- Identify issues in balancing the rights and interests of the different parties in property transactions and land development
- Assess the effectiveness of the legislative measures
- Apply legal principles and concepts to real life situations.

- The rights and obligations of property owners and developers
- How legislations are influenced by national and social imperatives
- The balancing of stakeholders' conflicting interests
