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Overview

The course covers basic concepts in Land Law. These including the doctrine of estates and tenures, title to land, rights and interests in land, steps involved in transfer of title, registration of title, landlord and tenant law and estate agency. Through content knowledge, students will gain an appreciation of legal analysis and reasoning, as well as the rationale for the current state of land law in Singapore.

Learning Outcomes

Students will be able to:

- Understand the background to Land Law in Singapore.
- Familiarise themselves with fundamental concepts in land law
- Understand the reasons for the emergence of Equity and its development alongside Common Law.
- Differentiate between the types of rights and interests in land, and understand their implications.
- Understand the rights of the parties in a lease relationship.
- Understand the implications of the different types of co-ownership and appreciate the application of trust principles on co-owned property.
- Understand the legal steps and flashpoints in the process of transfer of title to land.
- Understand the general principles of Agency, and rules related to Estate Agency.
- Identify the legal issue/s in disputes without being distracted by irrelevant/immaterial information.
- Apply legal principles correctly to case-studies.
- Use legal reasoning to support the stance taken by different parties in legal disputes.
- Make better use of the English language through their choice of words and articulate more effectively to make legally cogent arguments.

RE1703 *Principles of Law for Real Estate* – however note that this course is no longer offered. The equivalent pre-requisite is BSP1702 *Legal Environment for Business*

I have authored and co-authored texts on real estate law, and published widely in international journals and presented at international conferences on real estate-related as well as educational pedagogical issues.
