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### Overview

This course discusses the professional practice in the real estate field covering among others, valuation, property and facility management, marketing and property consultancy. It aims to provide students with an appreciation of the challenges and practical issues involved in professional practice. It highlights the ethical issues in professional practice, and deals with professional communication and interactions with clients and other professionals. Career planning and management including interview skills and business etiquette will be introduced.

### Learning Outcomes

This course is intended to help students understand economic, legal and ethical responsibilities to improve their professional life. Students will learn to:

- Identify the general obligations imposed by code of ethics and professional conduct.
- Evaluate challenging situations through a decision-making process that balances business, ethical and social considerations.
- Implement strategies to translate problems into successful outcomes.
- Develop personal strength and best practices for making difficult ethical decisions.
