Course: MNO3701 Human Capital Management

Session: Semester 2, AY2024/2025

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Course Outline:

This course introduces students to human capital management (HCM) and the concepts underpinning HCM in the context of a dynamic and complex environment in an age of digital explosion. Besides acquiring fundamental knowledge on HCM, students will appreciate how human capital is a key resource and a value-creation partner in contributing to the strategic goals and success of every organisation. The context for the management of human capital including globalisation and the legal framework will be examined. Issues confronting practitioners as they deal with the complexities in an invariably challenging environment will also be explored. At the end of the course, through reflective thinking, students will develop an understanding of the intricacies in HCM and its significance, thereby enhancing students' future-readiness in developing competencies that will help their organisations in creating a competitive advantage through human capital.

- 1. An understanding of the critical role played by human capital in value creation and contributing to the competitiveness and success of every organisation;
- 2. Knowledge of the link between HCM and organisational strategies as well as the critical functions of HCM in an organisation;

- 4. Being future-ready graduates in managing human capital in an age of digital explosion.
